BIRKBECK STUDENT PROTECTION PLAN (to 31 August 2025)

SECTION ONE: General information about Birkbeck's Student Protection Plan

Introduction: What is a Student Protection Plan?

- All universities and colleges registered with the Office for Students are required to have a Student Protection Plan in place and to review it regularly. The Student Protection Plan is designed to set out what events or other risks that Birkbeck might reasonably anticipate which, if they materialised, could pose a risk to you continuing your studies.
- This document explains our approach to identifying potential risks, managing those risks, who is covered by our plan, the steps we propose to take if we need to implement our plan and how we will communicate with students. You can find detailed information about the current potential risks in the table at the end of this document.
- Birkbeck will only implement its Student Protection Plan when it is necessary to protect your interest and when there is a risk of a serious disruption to the continuity of your studies. Should we activate our plan, we will do so in accordance with any guidance provided by the Office for Students or relevant government agency and will follow the three following guiding principles:
 - a. Our first consideration is how we can protect the student interest.
 - b. We will establish promptly an implementation plan that relates to the particular circumstances of the risk.
 - We will communicate with affected students in a timely manner and we will C. ensure affected students know how to obtain advice and guidance including independent support from the Students' Union. We would offer advice to all affected students providing a clear explanation about why the Student Protection Plan has been implemented, guiding students through their options in written communications (and where possible in-person or virtual briefings), signposting the Students' Union for independent advice and offering additional support through our wellbeing team including tailored support, as required, based on the individual needs of students. We would agree clear transition arrangements and maintain close liaison with any transfer institutions to ensure the certification of students' prior learning and the availability of equivalent support and resources for students throughout and after the transfer to the new institution. Birkbeck would take all possible steps to ensure that it could facilitate transfers to institutions with equivalent or comparable programmes of study (e.g. content, mode of study etc). Where it is not possible to identify a suitable alternative provider then the affected students will be provided with certification of their prior academic achievement (number and level of credits) which could be used to support a credit transfer arrangement to another institution in the future. Any refund of fees due will be paid in line with our Student Fees Policy and Student

- This Student Protection Plan has been prepared between April and October 2024 and we have set a period to 31 August 2025 for this assessment of risks. We will review the Plan and may update it as we consider necessary before that date.

Who Birkbeck's Student Protection Plan covers

- 6 This plan covers the following groups:
 - a. current students on any course/programme of study at Birkbeck at any level;
 - b. people who hold offers for admission to any course at Birkbeck at any level;
 - c. current students who are undertaking reassessment or are on approved breaks in study for any reason.
- If you are studying with Birkbeck and part of your study involves another institution, then you are still covered by this plan for your Birkbeck qualification. If the partner institution is separately registered with the Office for Students, then you may be covered by their Student Protection Plan.

Events which might activate the Student Protection Plan

- 8 This Student Protection Plan seeks to cover a range of foreseeable financial, regulatory and other risks and an indication of actions should this risk materialise. The types of risks that this might cover include (but are not limited to):
 - learning and teaching: for example, closing a programme or subject area.
 - regulatory risks: for example, restrictions to our powers to award degrees, loss of our licence to sponsor international students
 - infrastructure risks: for example, temporary or permanent closure of a campus.
- Our detailed analysis of current risks is included in Section Two: Current Assessment of Risks to the Continuation of Study and these might also reference distinct arrangements to manage the impact of a particular event (for example through business continuity plans).

Communication and Review

- Our Student Protection Plan is a public document, available on our website. The Plan is now reviewed annually and includes dates for the periods covered. You can find the plan here. Corporate policies and procedures Birkbeck, University of London
- Birkbeck's staff will be informed about changes to the Plan through its weekly newsletter to ensure that they are aware of everyone's obligations. It is the

- responsibility of the Executive Deans and Directors of Services to ensure that staff in their faculties and directorates are aware of the Student Protection Plan.
- We consult the Students' Union about the Plan and any proposed changes to the Plan and ensure that they have up to date versions of the Plan. Senior staff from all directorates and faculties have an opportunity to contribute to the Plan's development through relevant Committees and networks. The Student Protection Plan is overseen by the University Executive Board and approved by the College's Governors prior to its confirmation by the Office for Students.
- 13 If we update the Plan, we will ensure that you are notified through the weekly Student Bulletin as well as it always being available on the website. If we activate the Plan, a communication strategy for any affected students is an essential part of implementing the Student Protection Plan.

Implementing our Student Protection Plan

- The Student Protection Plan outlines a number of potential circumstances and risks which might mean we need to activate our Plan. It is the Vice-Chancellor who will decide, with senior staff, when the Plan should apply and will then set in motion an Implementation Plan. The nature of the Implementation Plan will depend on the circumstances Birkbeck faces.
- The first stage will be for the Vice-Chancellor and College Secretary to assess whether events require us to use our Student Protection Plan and to set in motion an appropriate implementation plan. The specific actions and responsibilities of this might include (but are not limited to) the following items.
 - a. Notify Birkbeck's Governors (Vice-Chancellor).
 - b. Notify the Office for Students of the circumstances and proposed actions and acting as a point of contact with the OfS (College Secretary).
 - c. Appoint a senior officer to act as the Plan Implementation Lead with appropriate delegated authority to design and deliver an appropriate implementation plan (Vice-Chancellor).
 - d. Ensure that Birkbeck logs and learns from use of its Student Protection Plan (Vice-Chancellor and College Secretary).
 - e. Close any report to the Office for Students when the Implementation Plan is complete (College Secretary).
- 16 The Plan Implementation Lead will:
 - a. identify a response team;
 - b. identify appropriate steps (for example, in the event of a programme closure, this might mean teach out options and/or the internal or external transfer of students or the offer of exit awards.
 - c. consider other remedies, including financial, in the event that suitable alternate academic options are not possible
 - d. ensure that an equalities impact assessment of options is conducted and a communications plan established;
 - e. implement the Plan;
 - f. confirm with the Vice-Chancellor and College Secretary when the Plan is concluded;
 - g. participate in reviewing the implementation plan and Birkbeck's learning from the experience.

Refunds

Our first aim will be to ensure that you are able to complete the programme of study that you have embarked upon or to provide a suitable alternative either within the College or by transfer elsewhere. We will seek to honour bursary commitments to the end of the agreed period where students transfer.

- The Terms and Conditions of Study terms-and-conditions-of-study.pdf Birkbeck, University of London (bbk.ac.uk) indicate our approach to providing refunds to students where it has not been possible to preserve the continuity of study, noting, "if the College is forced to discontinue a programme or module after students have begun their studies, we will inform them as soon as is reasonably possible and will use all reasonable endeavours to transfer them to a suitable replacement for which they are qualified. If students are not satisfied with the replacement provided by us or if we are unable to provide a suitable replacement, students may cancel the contract and withdraw from the course without incurring any further liability for tuition fees and shall be entitled to a refund of all tuition fees paid to date."
- The process outlined in our student complaints policy <u>Complaints Policy (bbk.ac.uk)</u> should be followed in cases where a student feels that any proposed solution implemented under the SPP is insufficient.

Students are usually enrolled on Birkbeck programmes which might be taught in conjunction with another institution, or the arrangement involves progression from one award to another at Birkbeck meaning that they could still complete their Birkbeck award separately, perhaps requiring additional modules at Birkbeck instead of the partner. We engage with partners to enhance the range of programmes and education we offer and have in place due diligence arrangements to check the quality and financial viability of prospective partner organisations. Our relationships are secured through agreements which provide notice periods and expectations about teaching out existing programmes should the partnership cease. We have undergone a period of organisational change including new School/Faculty structures and further transformation within central professional services. Professional accreditation is important for Birkbeck programmes in some of its areas, but not for all students. Programme change processes require explicit confirmation that accreditation requirements continue to be met. We maintain oversight of accreditation compliance through Faculty Education Committees reporting to the Education Committee. Re-accreditation exercises are owned by Schools and overseen by senior management. Requirements to meet professional accreditation requirements where applicable are embedded in programme approval processes. Our financial forecasting and forward planning, overseen by our Audit Committee and Governors, include an assumption that resources must be available to maintain accreditation when teaching out students already enrolled on courses. 6	The College is unable to operate as a provider of Higher Education because of its financial position.	Birkbeck has a robustly managed financial strategy and growth strategy including close management of expenditure. We have been undergoing a period of reorganisation and cost reduction for the past two years. As a registered provider, we are subject to an ongoing Condition of Registration by the Office for Students (condition D: Financial Viability and Sustainability) and are required to comply with the OfS's requirements with respect to financial viability and sustainability. The OfS monitors individual providers' financial viability and sustainability on an ongoing basis The overall situation for the HE sector is currently difficult, with reduced demand, limited ability to raise domestic fees and unfavourable policy for international student intake. Our regulatory provisions are fairly generous in completion periods (up to ten years) compared to other institutions, given our heritage in providing education to part-time students, so our risk assessment and financial projections are based on students being able to complete within the usual planned period for their mode of study. Our strategy to retain financial sustainability is to reduce costs and increase income. Cost reduction has been achieved through restructuring. Income increase will be delivered through improved efficiency in student recruitment, and developing new courses and markets including partnerships, attracting more students. This includes building further capacity for HyFlex teaching (both online and in person).
